
The vaccinations for the Year 9 students are now due.

This includes two single injections:

- The 3-in-1 teenage booster the diptheria, tetanus, and polio booster (Td/IPV)
- Meningococcal ACWY (MenACWY)

Along with these vaccines, your child can receive the following vaccination, if they are missing one or both doses:

Measles, Mumps, and Rubella vaccine (MMR)





Even if you do not wish your child to be vaccinated, please ensure you complete the consent form

In the absence of a signed consent form from parents, we invite young people to self-consent, providing they can demonstrate:

- an understanding of the vaccinations due.
- the benefits of vaccination compared to being unvaccinated.
- · the potential side effects of vaccination.

This is done on a case-by-case basis – ultimately, the decision to consent is the young person's choice. This is in line with the Gillick Guideline Competence.



Students are invited to join us to learn scuba diving skills in order to gain their full PADI Open Water qualification.





I know what you're wondering; when would I ever use Scuba Diving skills?

Skills lessons will take place with the **Blue Fin Diving club** at Lewisham swimming pool and all other learning is done online through the PADI app. Once students have passed their online learning and mastered the skills in the swimming pool, they will finish their qualification by diving to 18m in a deep lake in the UK.





What is a PADI Qualification?

PADI stands for '**Professional Association of Diving Instructors**' - the largest diving certification agency in the world.

However, if you're working on an off-shore oil rig, salaries range from £31,923 to £159,611






Coral Reef Restoration

Royal Navy Divers

Royal Navy Divers can be called to a range of tasks, including explosive disposal of historic ordnance (old military canons and similar), and rendering safe of improvised explosive devices around the UK, as well as clearing sea mines and deterring terrorists across the globe. They are also capable of carrying out emergency underwater maintenance on warships including the Queen Elizabeth-Class carriers, and delivering discreet special operations, (so shush).

The MET's Dive Team, (UCSST)

The Underwater and Confined Space Search Team (UCSST), better known as the Met's Dive Team, are all part of the Marine Policing Unit (MPU), but specialise as police divers; they carry out a huge range of tasks including: underwater searches, supporting crime scene investigations, body recovery, weapons recovery, and ship searches.



Underwater Archaeology

A relatively new branch of archaeology, owing to the difficulties of accessing underwater sites until the technology and training became available. Underwater archaeology is not restricted to the study of shipwrecks; changes in sealevels have left many ancient sites submerged, along with maritime remains such as crannogs, bridges, and harbours.

A VISIT TO THE CABINET WAR ROOMS


"History shall be kind to me, for I intend to write it."

Whatever the truth of the statement, Year 12 historians have spent the last term-and-a-half interrogating both the evidential and historiographical bases for the Churchill myth. And there is none greater, perhaps, than his wartime leadership. A visit to the IWM's Cabinet War Rooms on 3 February, then, gave students an in-person opportunity to investigate further.



After a short stop-off at Buckingham Palace to take in the spectacle of Changing of the Guard (and a glimpse of the King landing in the Royal Helicopter), we descended the dank steps into the labyrinthine world underneath Whitehall. Immediately confronted with the room in which Churchill presided over War Cabinet meetings – including Churchill's chair, famous for the arm gouged with scratch marks that speak volumes for the nervous energy of its occupant – students began to appreciate the sheer enormity and challenge of operating the government machinery whilst the bombs fell overhead.


As the tour continued, we saw the secret communications room – disguised as a private lavatory for the PM – in which Churchill held scrambled telephone conversations with Roosevelt. Students enjoyed exploring the Churchill Museum, including studying many of the primary source materials and debate prompts throughout. Particularly popular, too, was the game of "Ask Mr Tysall the Churchill Quiz Questions" – I concede that there was one question I could not answer!



We then wended our way miles farther into the tunnels, taking in the Map Room and its D-Day plotting of RAF deployments, the kitchens, rooms of Churchill's key advisors, and Churchill's own room, replete with the comfy-looking bed he used for his essential daily nap (16 minutes and no more!)



Students enjoyed the experience and had many interesting and useful questions about the rich information and displays they saw. A huge 'well done' to all for their exemplary conduct, and my thanks to Mr Morrissey and Ms Williamson for their support throughout.

DESIGN VENTURA CHALLENGE




Infiltration was a card game based of off a popular internet game aimed at teenagers. "Definitely a game that would challenge most and would be fun to play"

These are the design models made in Sketchup 2017 for the Extenda-Club:




The Extending Club, aimed at young golfers. To overcome the expense of buying new clubs when a child grows. "Great idea and money saver"



Over the last week, the Growing Greens have been making fat balls for the birds in the Quiet Garden. This has proved to be a very messy task but the birds have loved it!










The Growing Greens have also been cataloging their seed packets so we can plan what we will be sowing in the Spring.




MEAR & THEATRE TRIP



SCIENCE NEWS

RWS13 Biology students visited the Royal Institution for a genetics workshop, where they found out about the inheritance of taste receptors that determine our response to bitter tastes. Students extracted their own DNA, amplified their DNA using the Polymerase Chain Reaction and separated DNA fragments by size using gel electrophoresis. This was a fantastic opportunity for students to use the techniques they have learnt about during their Biology A Level curriculum.















We have a new cohort of Whizz Bang scientists who have spent January exploring elephant's toothpaste, testing the buoyancy of foil and plasticine boats and looking at the thermal decomposition of copper carbonate. This week's science club photos have been submitted by Harrison K in 7H.

Lastly, our Year 12 and Year 13 Chemistry A Level students took on the RSC Chemistry Olympiad challenge this month and we look forward to seeing how they got on. Students worked hard to push themselves beyond the knowledge of the curriculum.




