Dear Parent/Carer,

Welcome to this edition of our newsletter. As always, it has been a busy and purposeful fortnight at Ravens Wood, with many opportunities for our students to learn, explore and broaden their education beyond the classroom.

Last week's assemblies focused on languages and lifelong learning, with Mr French, Assistant Headteacher, and Mrs Jackson-Man, our Head of German, introducing students to the benefits of language learning through Duolingo and beyond. The message was clear: learning does not stop at the school gates, and curiosity and ambition are skills for life.

We were also delighted to take our Year 11 students to Poetry Live at the Apollo Theatre last Thursday. This was a fantastic opportunity to see their GCSE poetry come alive and deepen their understanding in an engaging and memorable way. My thanks go to the English staff who accompanied the trip and supported our students so effectively.

On Friday, some of our Year 10 students attended Future Frontiers, while we also hosted our annual Careers Fair here at school. With over 55 companies and representatives joining us, students were able to gain invaluable insight into a wide range of career pathways and future opportunities. Events like this play a crucial role in helping young people understand how the choices they make in education can shape their futures. Thank you to all our students for engaging so positively with our visitors, and to the staff who worked hard to make the event such a success.

This week has been just as full. Assemblies have been led by Mr Hunt, Assistant Headteacher, focusing on online safety and the importance of making responsible choices in the digital world. Year 8 students enjoyed storytelling sessions, while our Year 12 students took part in a research trip to the British Library on Thursday, developing the independent study skills so vital for success beyond school. We were also pleased to welcome back an alumni student who spoke to our sixth formers about Oxbridge courses and routes into higher education, as well as external visitors discussing the links between language and football through Mingalaba. A further group of students also attended Future Frontiers on Friday, continuing this important work around aspiration and ambition. As always, I would like to thank our staff for their dedication and commitment in supporting our students to broaden their education through rich and varied learning opportunities.

Following the incidents in the local community after school on Friday and Monday, we have continued to work closely with our School Police Liaison Team. I met with the police today and I am pleased to share that those involved have been identified and the matter is being dealt with.

As we approach the half-term break, this will be our final newsletter of this half-term, with just one week remaining. During the coming week, Year 11 and Year 13 students will be sitting their practice examinations (PPEs), followed by a further round of PPEs in the week commencing 23 February, when we return from the break. These assessments are an important opportunity for students to reflect on their progress, identify areas for development and prepare thoroughly for the summer examination series.



I would encourage all students, particularly those in examination years, to use the half-term break as a balance of rest and revision, taking time to recharge while also consolidating their learning and strengthening their study routines. We look forward to welcoming everyone back on 23 February refreshed, focused and ready to learn, and I wish all our students and families a relaxing and enjoyable half-term break.





CAREERS FAIR 2026


SCIENCE NEWS

MEDICAL CLOWNS USE A RANGE OF TECHNIQUES INCLUDING HUMOUR (OF COURSE), MUSIC, MAGIC, STORYTELLING AND PLAYFULL INTERACTION, TO CREATE A POSITIVE, CALMING ATMOSPHERE

AN NHS CLOWN, ALSO KNOWN AS A CLOWN DOCTOR, IS A SPECIALLY TRAINED PERFORMER WHO WORKS IN HOSPITAL ENVIRONMENTS TO SUPPORT THE EMOTIONAL AND PSYCHOLOGICAL WELL-BEING OF PATIENTS.



THEIR PERFORMANCES ARE CAREFULLY ADJUSTED DEPENDING ON THE PATIENTS AGE, MOOD AND MEDICAL CONDITION. FOR EXAMPLE, GENTLE HUMOUR FOR ANXIOUS PATIENTS AND ENERGETIC COMEDY FOR BORED PATIENTS

Members of our RWS Medical Futures club, across Year 10, 11 and 12, spent this term giving presentations on different medical careers – where the brief was to find a niche career that you hadn't heard of. We learnt about Polysomnographic Technologists from Tyler N and Kenan C in Year 10, NHS clowns from Aaron M in Y11, and Ocularists from Hannah P in Year 12. This is just to name a few, we heard about a huge range of careers, from aerospace physicians to doctors in tropical medicine. See below for some of the student's work!




How does an ocularist fit into a multi disciplinary team?

Ocularists fit into multi disciplinary teams when assisting with the rehabilitation of patients who have lost their eyes.


They work alongside Ophthalmologists who perform the surgery of the removal of the eye, Anaplastologists in complex cases involving trauma to the face structure and Oncologists if the eye loss is due to cancer to ensure prosthetic fitting aligns with cancer treatment and recovery plans

WHAT IS THE ROLE OF POLYSOMNOGRAPHIC TECHNOLOGISTS

- Polysomnography or PSG is the study of sleep that involves recording multiple systems in your body.
- PSG uses sophisticated equipment to record your brain, heart and respiratory system giving doctors a comprehensive view of the quality of your sleep.
- A PSG technologist records information and make observations while the patients sleep.

The students were thrilled to see their RWS doggo again.





UPDATE FROM OUR TRUST

**Working together to lift attendance and ensure
ambitious curriculum experiences across our Trust schools**



Leaders from across Impact Multi Academy Trust have been coming together at the start of this term for focused collaboration sessions, including on how we ensure a really powerful and whole-Trust core offer of curriculum experiences for all children in our Trust. This includes visits and trips outside of school, as well as activities outside of the classroom in school. This work builds on our Trust values of inclusion and ambition and is part of our aim that every child in our Trust schools is able to "find their something" that inspires them. This will build on the strong offer that is already happening in our individual schools and we look forward to sharing more in due course.

Then also in January, our school leaders came together to focus on one of the most pressing challenges facing schools and families nationally-attendance. Attendance in our Trust is good compared to national averages and is improving over time but it is still a key priority for our Trust schools. We heard from each-other about bold, creative strategies to re-engage students who are struggling, strengthen resilience, and support families. These include specific support for individual students, interventions to smarter use of data, improved pastoral care and really strong joint working with families. By sharing approaches our schools are shaping a unified strategy to support strong attendance across our Trust


What emerged clearly from all the sessions was the power of collaboration, one of our Trust values, and we look forward to sharing more in future updates.

JUNIOR STEM ACADEMY


This week, after working hard, the Junior STEM academy entered the Science & Innovation Competition, which is run by the Faculty of Natural Sciences at Imperial College.

The purpose of the competition is to motivate young people to engage with science, to encourage them to work together as part of a team and to engage them in a fun activity that is motivated by their curiosity and drive.




The goals we have chosen and why

- **Good health and well being** – this is a perfect fit as the air purifier will improve overall health especially for those with allergies.
- **Sustainable cities and communities** – this is a good fit as it will improve workspaces in factories throughout cities and helping communities.
- **Life on land** - this is another great goal for us as it improves the quality of air that everyone breathes in helping little by little.



Teams were asked to develop a new and innovative scientific solution to help achieve one of the [United Nation's Global Goals for Sustainable Development](#). To enter, teams were asked to create a 5-minute film. Examples of the entries included a Nutri-Box an ambitious plan to solve world hunger potentially with the help of drones. An air purifier that could clean cities air from any pollutants helping people breath. Finally using an old idea of water turbines the team promoted the idea of using the rainwater to power the houses around the drains.

1 TRANSPORT & PARKING

As the house is adjacent to Sundridge Park railway station, we will encourage all visitors to use public transport. Long term residents will know that this train service has declined over the years and we hope this project will support the broader campaign for maintaining/improving the station.

The size of the house means that only a small number of people could visit the house at any one time (around 15 people).

2 VISITORS IN PLAISTOW GROVE

Entry to the house will be via the rear entry from the alley behind the Crown pub and its garden. There should therefore be negligible impact in Plaistow Grove. Of course, people interested in Bowie do already visit to see the house and its 'blue plaque.'

3 BENEFITS TO THE AREA

Studies suggest that buildings of historic and cultural significance raise the profile of an area and make it more desirable. We will work with local schools as part of our Proud Places programme to teach young people about the history of Bromley, particularly its musical history.

4 ROLE OF LONDON BOROUGH OF BROMLEY


