

RECORD BREAKING RESULTS!



Ravens Wood School celebrates record-breaking GCSE results

Ravens Wood School is delighted to report an outstanding set of GCSE grades in 2019. The School's results are once again improved across all thresholds, including:

- Mathematics 9-7: 32%
- Mathematics 9-5: 65%
- Mathematics 9-4: 85%
- English 9-7: 26%
- English 9-5: 66%
- English 9-4: 83%

RWS11 students achieved an incredible **500** 7-9 grades across all subjects (26% of all grades) – a new record for the School. Of these, **77** elite Grade 9s were awarded to Ravens Wood students.

The number of students securing both English and Mathematics at 9-5 grades has increased to 56%, with 78% achieving a Grade 4 or above in both English and Mathematics. In addition to the superb English and Mathematics results outlined above, other high performing subjects include:

- Physics 75% 9-7 grades
- Chemistry 69% 9-7 grades
- Biology 65% 9-7 grades
- R.S 39% 9-7
- Geography 32% 9-7 grades
- Computer Science 32% 9-7 grades
- Design Technology 31% 9-7 grades
- History 28% 9-7 grades

Some examples of truly outstanding achievements by Ravens Wood RWS11 students include:

- Joseph Sampson: Nine Grade 9s (English Language, English Literature, Mathematics, Geography, German, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Statistics);

- Enzo Martins: Seven Grade 9s (English Language, Mathematics, Geography, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Design Technology);
- Oliver Williams: Seven Grade 9s (Mathematics, History, Geography, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Statistics);
- Giga Peters: Five Grade 9s (English Language, Mathematics, Geography, Chemistry and Design Technology);
 and
- Dan Shaw: Four Grade 9s (Mathematics, Geography, Computer Science and Biology).

Commenting on the terrific results, Headteacher, Sally Spence, said, "We are delighted with these superb results, which have risen to new heights in 2019. To achieve 500 Grade 7-9s is remarkable. Our students' performances across such a wide range of GCSE subjects shows the value and success of our broad and powerful KS4 curriculum. The vast majority of our students have secured grades which will unlock doors throughout their lives, and we are very proud of them. The hard work and dedication of our incredible staff make this possible".

Deputy Headteacher, Rob Leitch, added: "We are absolutely thrilled for our students – they have worked so hard for these superb results. Our bespoke RWS11 programme seeks to 'make every day count' for Year 11 students, and with 26% of all qualifications being achieved at the elite 9-7 grades, our students have truly risen to the challenge."



RWS celebrates continued success

Once again, Ravens Wood School are celebrating a tremendous set of A Level results in 2019. These excellent results build on those achieved in 2018, which led to the School securing a positive progress score for A Level (Level 3 Value Added).

With over 200 students receiving A Level results, Ravens Wood students achieved over 550 qualifications. Of these, 23% were awarded A*-A, 46% graded as A*-B, and 76% A*-C. The School's overall pass rate (A*-E) remained at an extremely impressive 98% in 2019. We are incredibly proud of our students; they have once again continued Ravens Wood's fine tradition of securing excellent A Level outcomes.

Ravens Wood students continue to benefit from a broad Sixth Form offer; in 2019, students have particularly excelled in the Humanities, with Geography (27% A*-A, 77% A*-B), Politics (40% A*-A, 60% A*-B), Economics (67% A*-B), History (57% A*-B) and Sociology (82% A*-B) all achieving impressive outcomes. Likewise, the School's languages continue to thrive at KS5, with French (33% A*-A) and German (25% A*-A) both performing strongly. Finally, Ravens Wood's Science results remain extremely high, including Physics (21% A*-A, 57% A*-B).

The following students performed exceptionally well across each of their subjects:

George Herbert - Physics (A*), Mathematics (A*), Further Mathematics (A*) & Computer Science (A*). Edward Holloway - Physics (A*), Mathematics (A*), Further Mathematics (A*), Biology (A). Ben Jordan - Mathematics (A*), Geography (A*) and Further Mathematics (A*). Sean Kenny - Mathematics (A*), Further Mathematics (A*), Computer Science (A) and Music (A). Jack McCabe - Geography (A*), History (A*) and Biology (B).

Once again, Ravens Wood students are now accepting prestigious places at some of the top universities in the country, as well as some of the highest quality apprenticeships. Ravens Wood's Headteacher, Sally Spence has congratulated all students: "We are extremely proud of all of our Sixth Form students,

they have worked incredibly hard to secure truly remarkable results, across an impressive range of academic subjects. These excellent outcomes are only possible with the dedication, subject knowledge and hard work of our teachers. Congratulations to all of our students; we wish them the very best of luck in their next steps."






The RWS Local Governing Body met for the first time this year on Wednesday evening. Our first meeting of the year focuses primarily on reviewing the results for GCSEs and A levels. We look at a number of measures and review how the school has performed in each one, in comparison to previous years and against what was expected of this cohort and in relation to the performance of all students nationally. As you may have seen on the website, the results were superb. We heard that this year there have been a large proportion of top grades, but importantly many students have achieved well beyond what might have been expected of them.



We know that students have worked hard and we congratulate them on their success. A huge word of thanks goes to all staff at the school who work together to support the students in achieving this success. Thank you all for your hard work.











The Impact Multi Academy Trust

As you will be aware, Ravens Wood and Hayes Schools are part of the Impact Multi Academy Trust. This Trust was formed in April 2017, and the partnership continues to be an excellent driver for school improvement and for supporting our sustainability, especially in these times of financial educational cuts. The schools are working more and more closely and can see the real benefits of the partnership for our students, staff and schools.

As a Trust, we have always been interested in growth where there are clear mutual benefits for all schools involved. Therefore, we did undertake consultation with Charles Darwin Secondary and Biggin Hill Primary Schools to explore them joining the Impact MAT. Whilst there was a great deal to recommend this, it has been decided not to proceed with the merger.

The Impact MAT is a strong Trust, comprising of two excellent Senior Schools, who collaborate well together whilst continuing to retain their individual strong identities and ethos. We are very happy to remain a two school MAT, but will also be open to discussions with other schools and Trusts to consider joining together in the future for the benefit of our schools.

Calling all Year 10, 11, 12 and 13 students

Parents/ guardians: a letter was sent this week regarding screening. We hope as many eligible students as possible benefit from this opportunity. Please consider it for your child.

CRY's mission is to identify those that are at risk from sudden cardiac death. Young people involved in sport, in particular, stress their heart the most and if they have an underlying cardiac abnormality, they are more likely to be at risk. It is important to emphasise that exercise is **NOT** harmful and sport itself does not cause cardiac arrest, but can exacerbate an undetected condition.

At a screening, your son/daughter will receive an electrocardiogram (ECG) that examines the electrical activity of the heart, and if required, an echocardiogram, as well as a physical examination. The ECG is a simple, non-invasive and painless test that will only take a few minutes to complete and is performed by qualified cardiac physiologists.

FREE SCHOOL MEALS

Free School Meals/Pupil Premium Payments are available to all eligible pupils attending Bromley maintained schools.

An application must be submitted to secure both Free School Meals and the Pupil Premium Payment. Pupils who have been eligible for Free School Meals since April 2018 do not need to renew applications until April 2022.

WHO SHOULD APPLY?

Parents of children aged four or over attending a maintained school in Bromley who received Child Benefit for the child/children and one or more of the following:

- * Equal Based JSA / ESA
- Income Support (IS)
- * Income Based Jobseekers Allowance (IBJSA)
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (IRESA)
- * Child Tax Credit, provided they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income, as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs, that does not exceed £16,190
- * Guaranteed Element of State Pension Credit
- * Where a parent is entitled to Working Tax Credit run-on (the payment someone receives for a further four weeks after they stop qualifying of Working Tax Credit
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- * Universal Credit with an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400 as assessed by earnings.

HOW TO APPLY

WHAT NEXT

Once Bromley Council have received your application, your details will be checked via the Eligibility Checking Service and you will be advised by letter whether or not your claim is successful. Confirmation of eligibility will also be sent to the school.

From April 2018 the criteria used to determine eligibility has been updated to reflect the roll out of Universal Credit Payments. To ensure families are not disadvantaged during the roll out period the following arrangements have been put in place.

Any child eligible for Free School Meals on 1 April 2018 will retain their eligibility until the end of the roll out in March 2022 regardless of family circumstance change. Once the roll out of the Universal Credit is complete no child will lose their entitlement and it will continue until the end of their current phase of education.


Silent Study begins for Year 11!

RWS STEM Form Group 2018/2019

2018/19 saw the creation of the RWS Stem form group at Ravens Wood; a vertically structured team comprised of 10 students from Year 8, 9 and 10. The students were selected by the Heads of Department from Science, Design and Technology, Computer Science and Mathematics. Throughout the year the group had the opportunity to work on a wide range of STEM related projects and competitions.



KVRA Centenary War Memorial Project

At the beginning of the 2018/19 academic year, Mr Hunt was approached by the Keston Village Residents Association, to help them with the design of an interpretation board to mark the 100 years since the original war memorial in Keston was installed. A STEM design team was created from the form group; Bode Robinson, Thomas Jackson-Clark, Mohan Slade, Charles Mullen began work on the project.



After a number of meetings with the Residents Association project leaders throughout the year and a great deal of hard work, the team presented their draft design to a very receptive audience at the KVRA Annual General Meeting. The feedback on the design was superb, on returning to Ravens Wood, the team began work of the second improved iteration which will be being installed in Keston Village next to the War Memorial on Saturday 10th October 2020

The Institute of Engineering and Technology Faraday Challenge Day 2019 Competition Winners



On the 1st of April, STEM's year 8 representatives went to Langley Park School for Girls and competed against other school in the IET Faraday Challenge. Teams were tasked to create a product to help the scientists and engineers at the Northrop Grumman's Redondo Beach facility build the James Webb space telescope. Separated into teams of six, students began by assigning roles of authority to members, all of which had their own specific job to do in the group such as; electrics manager, design manager and group leader. With only a small sum of money, the groups had to plan out their ideas and estimate the cost of the supplies their group required. After a days' worth of engineering and creativity, all four groups came out with a finished manufactured product and a presentation to present to the judges. After much deliberation, one of the Ravens Wood teams came out on top with one of the Langley girls' teams being a close second followed by the second Ravens Wood teams; a great result for the school and the students participating in the winning team. This was a national competition where each team scored points, when the last Challenge Day had been completed there were 189 schools in the league table, with the Ravens Wood team coming joint 7st with 88 points from 100 available. The Institute of Engineering and Technology National Festival for Aspiring Engineers 2019 Aspiring Engineers Choice Award Winners

On the 26th of June, the winning team travelled to London to participate in the final round of the competition at The Institute of Engineering and Technology National Festival for Aspiring Engineers. The team had to create display materials and a presentation on the importance of space exploration and their ideas for where space exploration was headed in the future. The Ravens Wood entry won the top prize on the day, the Aspiring Engineers Choice award which was voted on by all who attended the day. Judges announced that our team had won by a landslide.

Year 5 STEM Challenge Day 2019; The International Year of the Periodic Table



On Thursday 27th June Ravers Wood School welcomed 120 Year 5 pupils from local Primary schools to the annual STEM Challenge Day. The United Nations General Assembly during its 74th Plenary Meeting proclaimed 2019 as the International Year of the Periodic Table of Chemical Elements. To mark this significant event, the students spent the day learning about the Periodic Table through a wide variety of activities and practical investigations. The event culminated in the students producing a human Periodic Table with each individual element handmade by the students during the day. Ravens Wood Year 10 STEM ambassadors were able to take an aerial photograph with a drone that they had built as part of the school's extended STEM curriculum. Feedback from the pupils involved was overwhelmingly positive, with many participants making Ravens Wood their first choice of secondary school. The school is looking forward to inviting students to the 2020 event



This week Ms Coveney, Elliot Austin and Micah Gardner talk about why reading is important.

Ms C: I'm biased obviously, I'm an English teacher, so why do you think reading is important?

EA: It strengthens your vocabulary and widens it. The more you read, the more vocabulary you have.

MG: When you read something as well, you can see how it is spelt, if you just hear it, you might never know.

MG: It also improves your imagination: without it you will have nothing to think about and no new ideas.

EA: Yes, it can give you inspiration. When you read something in a book, you can find ideas of how to challenge yourself.

Ms C: Do you think it also opens you up to other perspectives? I read Bone Sparrow this year, and it really gave the perspective of a refugee in a way that I had never experienced before?

MG: I read The Hunger Games a while back and it put me in the shoes of someone whose childhood was being forced into doing something. Even though it's not real, there are children in the world who have no choices.

EA: Yes - it lets you feel what other people feel and see what other people see. It also shows you that your perspective is not always right.

MG: Oh yeah, when I read The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night time, I didn't understand autism and I maybe thought about it negatively because I didn't understand it, which is silly because I'm dyslexic. But, it helped me understand that people with autism are individual in the way that my dyslexia makes me individual.

MG: Why do you think people find reading difficult?

Ms C: That's a good question and I think that the simplest answer is that it takes work and effort; there are so many complex parts to reading that all need to work in unison. Today, there are so many other distractions that make it difficult for us to find the time to really focus on reading. I'm as guilty as anyone else when it comes to that, but I do try to make some time every day to read.

MG: Video games and movies also tell stories and they take no effort.

EA: I don't disagree, but the problem is that they don't really improve your creativity or your vocabulary in the way reading does.

Ms C: If you could give one piece of advice to a Year 7 about reading, what would it be?

EA: Take recommendations, not orders - you need to enjoy what you're reading. Ask your family, your English teacher, especially one in the Reading Room.

MG: Also, depending on what your other interests are - use that to make your choices. If you like football, read about football.

Ms C: My tip would be to get into bed twenty minutes earlier than you want to go to sleep and read then.

MG: And when your parents say "Turn off your Xbox", they probably will allow you to read a book!
