

On Tuesday the 19th of March, Year 12 and Year 13 Art & Photography students travelled to Middlesex University with Miss Abbott to partake in bespoke Photographic workshops. can. It is launched in a rocket to an attitude of approx LUOUm and then records telemetry data during its return to Earth, also carrying out additional scientific investigations. The teams recently took their CanSats to a regional launch event to carry out a test rocket launch. All three CanSats were successfully launched, allowing vital testing of the internal scientific instruments, internal electronic components and parachute recovery systems. The data collected during the test launches will now be used to improve the design and construction of the CanSats ahead of any

future launches.

Years 7-10 celebrated British Science Week in style with an array of practical lessons and new opportunities for learning. The theme of this year's Science Week was 'Time' and so the Science department created new and engaging activities that capture the importance of Time in our universe, with awe and wonder at the heart of these lessons. Our first task was to make marble timers - a challenging and creative engineering task. The aim was to make the marble reach the end exactly 10 seconds after letting go at the start. (Big thank you to those that donated resources for this activity)




We learned about the biological importance of time for seed dispersal of plants. Students made and modified their own seeds and learnt that successful dispersal gives plants a competitive advantage and time in the air is essential for this. We also tested our own nervous systems by measuring our reaction times using only a ruler. This practical required close attention to the control variables to negure our results were valid.



Bromley holiday activities and food programme

Bromley's Holiday, Activities and Food programme (HAF) provides free holiday club places, including activities and healthy meals outside of term time, for eligible families with children and young people aged between 5 to 16 years old.

Our programme allows children and young people to enjoy fun and enriching activities that will enable them to develop new skills, build confidence and meet new friends. Each session will allow your child to take part in some form of physical activity as well as creative and educational tasks. They will also learn about the nutritional aspect of the food they eat, whilst enjoying a free nutritious meal each day.

Since the initial pilot in 2021 our HAF programmes have been a remarkable success and we look forward to updating you on what we have to offer in the year 2024.

The HAF programme runs during the Easter, Summer, and Christmas holidays only.

Eligibility

The programme is free for children and young people who are in receipt of benefit related free school meals or in Bromley as a refugee. If you have any questions about eligibility, please contact the team at HolidayActivitiesandFood@Bromley.gov.uk.

Proof of such benefits may be required upon booking.

Funding

The Holiday Activities and Food programme is funded by the Department for Education. In addition to this programme, families who are eligible for Universal Credit may be able to claim back up to 85 per cent of their childcare costs. Please read the Universal Credit and childcare guidance on the GOV.UK website to find out more.
