




The Personal Statement

70% about your choice of course

- Why do you want to study it?
- How you have studied it beyond the curriculum
 - ✓ Articles you have read
 - ✓ Books you have read
 - ✓ Lectures you have attended

30% about you

- How you have contributed to the wider school community
- Participation in sports and other extra curricular activities
- Work experience





Apprenticeships

- Apprenticeship participation in 2022 was 195,600
- Up to 28,000 apprenticeship vacancies available at any one time
- After finishing, 7 in 10 apprentices stay with the same employer
- All apprentices earn a salary
- Very competitive





Types of Apprenticeship

Higher Level Apprenticeships (also known as Degree Apprenticeships)

- Split your time between university and the workplace
- Fees covered by the employer and the government
- Level 6 apprenticeship is equivalent to a Bachelor Degree
- Level 4 is equivalent to a Foundation Degree

Advanced Apprenticeships

- Equivalent to A Levels
- Level 3 qualification gained
- This is dependent on the industry
- e.g. Level 3 Diploma in Business



Parents also have the opportunity to explore Unifrog and can set up an account with a one off code – Parent Code = WOHPparents











- Enrolment into Year 13 12th July
- Minimum of 3 D grades required
- BTEC students must be on track to meet their Minimum Target Grades





The sprint vs the marathon mentality



Sprint

- Revision starts after the syllabus has ended and not before
- Realise there is a lot you don't know
- Start cramming and attending revision classes
- Work late in the night to get your work done
- Can create a feeling of panic
- Time spent in crisis management





Marathon (with a final sprint)



- Re-visiting happens all the way through
- Organise notes in advance
- Has time to examine the data
- Can keep in control and pace yourself
- Plenty of time to ask about weaknesses
- PLC completed
- Smith Pro-forma leads revision
- Time booked in to 'fix' them
- Creates a sense of being in control

- Attend all lessons and supervised study sessions
- Engage in the above with a sense of maturity
- Make effective use of your PLC's
- Complete homework tasks | Independent study tasks | Meet deadlines
- Seek additional support/guidance if required

REVISION TIPS | DIGITAL DETOX



- The average person checks their phone
 47 times a day
- Students using their devices while studying <u>scored lower test results</u> and were less effective at tasks
- Students who revised in QUIET environments performed over 60% better in an exam than their peers who revised listening to music





REVISION TIPS | TIME MANAGEMENT



- Short, regular revision sessions are more effective than cramming
- 30/45 minute blocks per topic/subject will allow you to stay engaged and retain information





REVISION TIPS | GOAL SETTING


















- Set mini targets and ensure they are <u>SMART</u>
- <u>Reviewing</u> your targets/goals will allow you to identify success which can be <u>motivating</u>



REVISION TIPS | STRUCTURE IS IMPORTANT Preparing for Success





- Create a <u>revision timetable</u> and stick to this
- Ensure you have time for things that you enjoy as well – gym etc
- Use your <u>PLC</u> to help structure your revision timetable





REVISION TIPS | TEACHER FEEDBACK



- Ensure you are asking for feedback from your teacher
 - Homework
 - Assessments
- Must identify the <u>areas of weakness</u> so you can improve
- Act upon feedback



Lack of sleep





You need 8½ to 9 hours sleep per night





What happens if you don't get enough sleep?

- Reduced decision-making skills
- Poorer memory
- Reduced concentration
- · Reduced work efficiency
- Shortened attention span
- Increased risk for weight gain, depression, diabetes and cardiovascular Disease
- Reduced alertness
- · Poorer judgement
- Reduced awareness of the environment and situation
- Slower than normal reaction time


